3 Contents of peace education

(1) Kayoko Sakura III Project: The origin of Himi JHS's peace learning activities

The Kayoko Sakura Project started when the mother of Kayoko HAYASHI, a victim of the atomic bombing in Nagasaki, decided to plant a cherry tree in memory of her child. Kayoko Sakura II Project continued the memoriam by cutting branches from the original tree and planting them in various locations, including Himi Junior High School courtyard. The new project's goal is to raise the third generation of cherry blossoms and send them to the world. This is an initiative that seriously aims for world peace, with the keywords of "parental love," "sibling bonds," and "friendship support." And through the cultivation of cherry blossoms, this activity also aims to foster "people" who can hope for and realize world peace.

(2) Peace panel discussion

Through discussions with instructors who are close to the students' age and who are active on the front lines such as; high school peace ambassadors, survivors of atomic bombings, and members of the city's peace declaration drafting committee; the students will increase their understanding of and motivation for more practical peace activities.

(3) Anne Frank Exhibition

In addition, many panels from the Anne Frank Foundation in the Netherlands were sent to Japan. And that very same exhibit, which has traveled all over the country 118 times, came to our school. It was an opportunity to spread knowledge about the catastrophes in Europe. And further inform our students on the devastating impact of war.

(3) Day to think about peace

Furthermore, we watched the Kids Guernica 2023 program, participated in a Peace Balloon release, and also read a message about peace from the Ukrainian people. These efforts helped our students develop their own ideas on how to create a peaceful world. In conclusion, our students developed a heartfelt connection with the people of Ukraine and sent their very own message in return, in hopes of further spreading peace to the world.
